of our history. The presentation began with the year 1914 and detailed our predecessor and local fraternity roots, much of which was unbeknownst to many members. The organizing team of brothers dug up some great photos from the chapter archives and displayed them on two huge screens throughout the presentation. During the evening's festivities, we celebrated two members, **Dave Kem '66** and **Ron Lewis '88**, who were recognized as Significant Sigs by Sigma Chi International Fraternity. Dave's and Ron's honors give Beta Rho a total of nine Significant Sigs to date.

Significant Sig Lt. General **Paul "Butch" Funk '61 (Ret.)** spoke of the major role Beta Rho men had in the two World Wars, Vietnam, and the conflicts in the Middle East. At the end of the evening, Brothers Funk and Geddings presented each of the military veterans in attendance with the Sigma Chi Foundation's Military Service Recognition Pin. All brothers present who have been Sigma Chi brothers for more than 50 years received a 50-year pin from the International Fraternity. The veterans gathered for a group photo with actives and alumni, accompanied by the 2016 and 2017 Sweethearts of Sigma Chi.

Bright and early (or so it seemed) Saturday morning, over 100 brothers participated in the Sigma Chi Ritual performed by the active chapter, an important event for Beta Rho given the breadth of years represented by the members in attendance. Many attendees considered the event moving as they had not witnessed a Ritual in several years. The open house and comeand-go luncheon at 722 South Willson Avenue were next on the itinerary; active brothers had arranged for a large tent in the back lot that perfectly accommodated the unusually warm, sunshiny, Montana fall day. Attendees lingered for hours to enjoy discussions with classmates and to meet brothers from other years. The open house was followed by a monstrous tailgate of a couple hundred Sigma Chis at Bobcat Stadium, followed by a football game that our Bobcats could have won, but came up short in the final minutes.

The centennial celebration weekend was a fabulous event. We all left with renewed and intensely positive feelings for the future of Beta Rho Chapter.

As the grandson of a Sigma Chi from the Beta Delta Chapter, Gerald "Gerry" Steinbrenner '81 had a predestination that pulled him toward the fraternity. Both his mother and father were Greeks, and they encouraged him to get informed about the chapters at Montana State University and go through formal recruitment.

Sigma Chi stood out to Gerry because "its chapter house was a good source of camaraderie, brotherhood, and academic assistance," he recalled. As an undergraduate, he always looked forward to Derby Days and cheering on the Cats.

Gerry found an outstanding mentor in his chapter advisor,

Ritchie Secor '71, and made friends of **Dean Stensland '80** and **Thomas Farago '79**—men he remains in touch with today. "Dean, Tom, and I had tailgate spots at the main entrance for nearly 25 years," Gerry noted. "We still return to campus from Missoula for home games."

The memories from Gerry's active years and the friendships with his chapter brothers that have endured for decades are because of his membership in Sigma Chi. When Beta Rho announced their capital campaign, *Honoring Our Past 100 Years: Beta Rho's Vision for 2025*, Gerry knew he had to help.
