The planned Texas barbecue had to be moved inside but Butch's wife, Danny, and the big family put on a fine cocktail party with spectacular hors d'oeuvres followed by a great, sit-down dinner in their huge party room. All the Beta Rho Sigs and families, kids, grandkids, great-grandson, friends (including Major General Paul Calvert, and his family, CG 1st Cavalry Division, a Sigma Chi Friend)) gathered around, as **Bryan Henson '84** emceed the official Significant Sig ceremony. The keynote address was masterfully delivered by **Walt Smith '85** from Seattle, and there was not a dry eye in the house. Helen Sloan observed, 'I'm just blown-away by this tremendous, military-family atmosphere that permeates everything around Ft. Hood and the Funks.'

The Saturday schedule afforded additional military VIP tours and opportunities to mingle with the troops as well as the brothers before heading back home. We all departed with a new appreciation for our military and their very professional

Like Father, Like Son

Significant Sig Lt. Gen. Paul Funk II and His Beta Rho Experience

As seventh in a long line of Sigma Chis, there was only one fraternity for **Lt. Gen. Paul Funk II '84**. Paul comes from a proud family of Soldiers and Sigma Chi alumni. Funk II followed his father **Lt. Gen. (Retired) Paul "Butch" Funk '61**, who served Beta Rho as Magister and Consul and 32 years as a Soldier. Both sides of Paul's family have strong ties to Montana State University and the Beta Rho chapter of Sigma Chi.

Paul's family of Montana State University alumni includes his father **Paul "Butch" Funk**, mother **Sheila "Danny" Funk**, grandfather **Frank Brown '30**, uncles **Chester "Chet" Brown '59**, **Robert "Bebo" Brown '62**, **Jon Funk '65**, and cousin **Col. Darrel Charlton '64**. "I learned the value of service to this nation by watching my father as he served his country for over 32 years" Paul says. "Montana State and Beta Rho gave me the opportunity to follow his example."

In his early days at Montana State University, Paul was attracted to Sigma Chi's core values. "As the son of a Soldier, and part of the Army family for 57 years now myself, I think it's hard to overstate the importance of justice, friendship, and learning. The values this organization instills in its members helped shape my college experience and those same values are no less important to me today."

As a student, Beta Rho pushed Paul to succeed. "I like to joke that I wasn't always the best student, and if I wasn't part of an organization that valued learning, I might not have graduated at all." Paul graduated MSU with a speech communication degree and a commission in the United States Army through the MSU Army ROTC program.

Paul continued his journey of lifelong learning in both his civilian and military education. He later earned his Master of Science in Administration from Central Michigan University. As a Soldier, Paul is a graduate of the Army Armor Officer Basic and Advanced Courses, the Command and General Staff College, and the Senior Service College as a fellow attending the Institute of Advanced Technology at the University of Texas in Austin.

It wasn't just the focus on values and learning that Paul appreciates from his time in Beta Rho. "**Bud Hall '61** and **Barry Hedrich '81**, our Consul at the time, were strong mentors, even after we graduated. Their support was so important to me." He stays in contact with many other Beta Rho brothers, including **Tom Heck '80**, **Terry Bruckbauer '82**, **Larry Larsen '82**, **Bob Morton '82**, **Bryan Henson '84**, **Walt Smith '85**, **Tom Sullivan '86** and his wife, Gina Sullivan, **Skip Higgins '84**, and our sweetheart, Betty Higgins. *(Continued on page 6)*

Active Chapter Focuses on Unity of Brotherhood and Community Service

The Beta Rho Chapter has seen yet another successful year, filled with a generous amount of community service projects, philanthropic events, and awards won by our brothers. This year started off strong, and we have continued to take every opportunity available to increase the unity of our brotherhood and become a driving force within our community. This was recently exemplified when Montana State University awarded our chapter the House Cup, which is given to the Greek house that shows the most outstanding support and involvement within the campus community. We are very pleased with the amount of success we have seen from our brothers and look to build upon it to continue to grow stronger.

Building a Better Community

Out of all our brothers' most recent accomplishments, none are more impressive or selfless than their immense increase in community service and philanthropic efforts. Thus far our chapter has raised over \$18,000 (which is up from last year's \$8,000), and we are eager to reach \$20,000 by the end of the semester. On top of that, the Beta Rho Chapter has partnered with organizations such as Habitat for Humanity, Shodair Children's Hospital, the Gallatin Valley Food Bank, and many others to help those in our community that are less fortunate. In the fall semester alone, our brothers completed a total of 1,236 hours of community service, which averages about 15.5 hours per brother. We are planning our next project, which will be a blood drive held at our house through the American Red Cross.

Leaders of Men

On top of all the work they do helping our com-

munity, our brothers also hold many ambitions within their personal lives. It is not uncommon to see a Sigma Chi sitting at the top of a student organization at Montana State. From the Interfraternity Council to the finance club, many of our brothers are involved on campus, and those that aren't typically hold a job. Our brothers also continue to show a large involvement in intramural and club sports. The most notable of these are our brothers on the MSU club hockey team, who this year made it to the national championships. Overall, 86% of our brothers are involved in some other organization, which helps to ensure our values are well spread within our community.

Friendship, Justice, and Learning

Even with our brothers' increased involvement within our community, they still hold strong in their academics; attaining a chapter grade point average that surpasses the all-men's average GPA at MSU. In almost every way, our brothers have looked to apply the ideals of Sigma Chi within their lives and inspire those around them to do the same. It is obvious to anyone that spends time around the Beta Rho Chapter that our brothers are a united strength dedicated to fighting for what we believe to be just. In a time where many fraternities are seeing failure, the Beta Rho Chapter continues to see new success and stays strongly rooted in our ideals of friendship, justice, and learning.

Sigma Chi Continues to Lead the Way

Internationals Sets the Standard for Fraternities

We are all proud of the many facets of our great fraternity: our chapter, our brothers, the Sigma Chi values, and the alumni from other places that we have met over the years. In our formative undergraduate years, we developed our understanding of the Sigma Chi values of friendship, justice and learning and built leadership attributes that have enabled us to become productive and caring participants in our families and communities.

But we seldom pay attention to the role that Sigma Chi International leadership has played and continues to play to keep our fraternity strong and up to date with the changing times. Are you aware of the significant leadership shown by our fraternity over the past year? Unless you have been following closely, you might not be fully up to speed on the many positive actions that have been taking place.

International Policy Changes

Early last year, Sigma Chi International leadership announced four specific policy changes and reinforced longstanding policies on alcohol and drugs. In summary, the policies prohibit hard alcohol in chapter facilities, eliminate alcohol at social events during recruitment, cap the size of social events, and limit the chapter pledge education program to a maximum of five weeks. *Further details and FAQs can be found at www.sigmachi.org/policychanges.*

As Grand Counsel **Tommy Geddings Jr. South Carolina '85** said at the time of these announcements, "Culture change is never easy, and that sentiment will ring true as Sigma Chi embarks on this new era. Yet, we are resolved to eliminate the antithetical behaviors that have so unfortunately become coupled with the idea of being a fraternity man. Sigma Chi was founded on the principles of friendship, justice and learning. Since our humble beginnings in 1855, Sigma Chi has been on a mission to make the world a better place through the impact of many men working together toward that common purpose. The time to make our actions congruent with our beliefs is here, and only by doing so will we ever be able to come close to contributing to that mission that our seven Founders set as our course."

Our Sigma Chi International leadership is strong. Your scribe has met most of our international leadership brothers over the past three years and I can report that they are an impressive group of experienced, dedicated volunteers who devote a significant part of their time to ensuring the progress and success of Sigma Chi Fraternity.

Undergraduate Men Grow at Leadership Programs

Sigma Chi offers many leadership training programs for undergraduate brothers. Our vision is "to become the preeminent collegiate leadership development organization—aligned, focused and living our core values." Your Beta Rho Chapter, a 10-year Bell Chapter and a consistent Peterson Significant Chapter Award winner, sends eight chapter officers each summer to the Krach TLW for leadership training to plan the chapter's strategies for the following year. As well, our brothers have benefitted from all the above programs and over the years have used Mission 365 training to build a strong, sustainable chapter of 85 quality brothers and to ensure we maintain a full live-in chapter house. The chapter is debt free, has a sizeable "rainy day" fund, and the actives have pledged \$150,000 to the house renovation program. Beta Rho continues to provide consistent leadership on the MSU campus on many fronts.

Reconnect with Sigma Chi

Certainly, there are a lot of great things happening in the world of Sigma Chi. And you played a role in Sigma Chi history. Your years at Beta Rho were the beginning of all your brotherhood experiences and these experiences to some extent formed the foundation for the rest of your life. Sigma Chi brotherhood never ends. Though its direct role in our lives might diminish from time to time, the values we learned from Sigma Chi during our university days remain part of our core being.

For many of us, it might have been a long time since we have had a direct Sigma Chi or Beta Rho experience...a visit with a brother, attending an alumni chapter meeting in your area, a visit to South Willson, attending an initiation. We might be at the point in our lives where we wish to renew the lifelong commitment to the development of self, others, and community through Sigma Chi's values-based living.

In 2018, Paul was named Significant Sig, following his father, Butch, who was awarded Significant Sig in 1991. This is the 10th Significant Sig award for Beta Rho. "When I joined Sigma Chi, I joined something bigger than myself. I became part of a brotherhood that sought to make better leaders and citizens of every member. Throughout my life, I've always gravitated toward being part of something bigger."

Paul has commanded at every echelon in the U.S. Army through the corps level. He has deployed and led Soldiers in combat six times, beginning with Desert Shield and Desert Storm, and continuing through the Global War on Terror. Most recently, Paul commanded the Combined Joint Task Force - Operation Inherent Resolve in 2017 and 2018 where he led the coalition of 74 nations with one mission - the defeat of ISIS. His sixty months of combat tours include two in Operation Iraqi Freedom, one in Operation Enduring Freedom, and two in Operation Inherent Resolve.

Paul currently serves as the Commanding General of the Third Armored Corps - known as "America's Hammer!" and the "Phantom Corps" headquartered at Fort Hood, Texas. In this role he commands over 40% of the Army's combat power and more than 90,000 Soldiers spread across six states. He was recently confirmed for promotion to four star general and the next Commanding General of the Army's Training and Doctrine Command.

Paul and his wife, Beth, have three children, Amanda and her husband Jake, Matthew and his wife Christine, and Nate. They have one grandson, Jack. In his spare time, Paul enjoys spending time with his family, golfing, hunting, and fishing.
